## **LOCAL UPDATES**

Following the County Council meeting about the crossing proposals for Ock Street and Marcham Road, disappointment and frustration about the outcome is shared by many on our estates, as there is still considerable anxiety about the problems that the increased traffic will bring. If no legal challenge, then the 158 or so properties will go ahead on the Drayton Road. Next year we will have the added problem of the closure of Steventon Bridge which may be closed for around 8 months and work will also soon be started on the Milton interchange. # **CHAUNTERELL WAY PLAY AREA**

A Ladygrove resident was concerned that the gate to the Chaunterell Way play area was being left open, allowing access for dogs. She also had recently found broken glass around the play equipment. The Residents' Association contacted the Town Council who have agreed to put a notice on the gate to remind users to close it behind them. They will also check that the gate is easy to close. They confirm that they litter pick the area 4 or 5 times a week and also have independent safety checks from the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents and their insurance brokers. They also say that they should be able to respond to reports of dangerous items within 24 hours or sooner, and also ask for the co-operation of the community in all this. The Town Council staff will ensure the 'cattle grid' section in the gateway in kept in good order to prevent dogs from entering. The Community Police have agreed to pay attention to the area on their patrols.

## THE LAST OF THE POETS

Tony Godfrey writes: Over the last few months we have been looking at the poets of Tithe Farm. The last one, Byron, was a bit of a maverick and he is to be found on the other side of Mill Road. Byron was a great poet but is probably more famous because of his scandalous life, but he was politically and socially aware too. His early poetical success was 'Childe Harold's Pilgrimage'. However, because of his shocking behaviour (not fit or TFLRA readers!) and because of debt, he went into exile on the continent in 1815. In 1824 he joined the struggle for Greek independence but died of malaria before active service. Interestingly his legitimate daughter was a mathematician and was involved in the development of computers. Byron was described in his day as Mad, Bad and Dangerous to know - but he was never dull.

#### THE GARDEN IN DECEMBER

Martin Gulliver writes: So ... Christmas in the garden, eh?? Let's face it no one wants to garden over Christmas, unless it's digging up fresh parsnips on the day, which I did a few years ago - they tasted fab. However you will have need to have sown those back in March - so where were you?? How about making a centrepiece for the table? Buy a small piece of oasis from the flower shop and then cover it in bits and pieces from the garden. Ivy is a good cover-all, and then add anything with berries...holly, pyracantha, cotoneaster...get them before the birds do!! Leave the arrangement in a saucer of water so that the oasis soaks it up, and it should last well.

A stroll down to the river on Boxing Day is also nice - feeding the ducks, swans, moorhens...and by the way - if it has red on its beak it's a moorhen, if white, it's a coot.

Finally, if you really want to stay in, at least look out at the garden and make any plans for the new year - what to move, plant, repair, dig up...and make a careful note.

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#### **CHRISTMAS IN AUSTRIA**


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An Austrian resident writes: Christmas is celebrated in most countries in Europe in different ways. In Austria the main celebration is on the evening of the 24th of December with a special but simple meal, often fish, carp or some other fresh water fish. The presents and tree are brought by the "Christkind" (Christ as newborn child) for the children, although it is the parents who prepare everything in a room in secret, out of sight of the children who are getting more and more excited by the minute. The tree is normally decorated with silver balls, silver coated or wrapped walnuts, sweets and genuine bees' wax candles. The room is then entered when everything is "ready" and the sound of a little bell is the sign that the "Christkind" has come. Then Christmas carols are sung by the family around the lit tree before the presents are opened.

On the 25th a special meal is prepared. It may be something local, turkey is not a tradition, although some families may eat them. Nowadays many "Santas" are also seen in shop windows and on the streets of major cities. How children are able to square the circle between "Christkind" and Santa is a mystery. The idea of Santa bringing the presents is actually rooted in "St. Nicholas" whose saints day is the 6th of December. But that is another story.
