Welcome to the February newsletter. We hope that there will be something to interest everyone in this edition. I would like to say a big thank you to the two residents who phoned, offering to deliver newsletters. Without this help, the newsletter could not continue.

Councillors' surgery Lilian Barry sent us a report of the January Councillors' surgery held in the Jephson Common Room with Peter Green.

1) The bus shelter in Drayton Road has been vandalised again. Peter is going to ask for the window panels and roof to be repaired.

2) Eleven dropped kerbs need to be placed at various points to enable disabled people with motorised vehicles easy access.

3) The open air swimming pool will be opened on the Spring Bank Holiday at the end of May. Funds will last for five years, but after that, it will close unless fund raising events can be arranged. So, use it or lose it!

4) The footpath to Tesco's. When the residential building opposite the hospital is opened, there may be funds known as "planning gains", which could fund improvements to the footpath.

5) A number of events are planned for the coming year, including the traditional bun throwing. 2006 is an important year for Abingdon, as it is the 450th anniversary of the granting of the Charter.

Abingdon Hospital You may have read in the local newspapers of the possibility of the closure of in patient services at Abingdon Hospital. This would be part of a county wide restructuring of community hospitals, but there would be a "full public consultation" first. If you are concerned by these proposals, why not write to the newsletter with your views.

Save Radley Lakes Don't forget the "Save Radley Lakes" campaign. You may remember reading in the summer about the proposal by RWE Npower to fill the two remaining lakes with pulverised fuel ash. You may have signed a petition or written to the County Council. RWE Npower withdrew their original application, but will shortly be resubmitting it, so the campaign continues. Family tree 6

In this final piece I thought I would bring together all the ideas I have suggested by explaining how my own Family Tree was brought to life.

My interest was first aroused when an Aunt of mine in my home town, Southampton showed me two large family Bibles, a folder full of certificates and a wealth of anecdotes. She had already started making a few notes and she passed these on to me so I was able to jot down a partial tree. I had nothing further back in my own line than my Great Grandfather so I then popped into Abingdon library to browse the Family History section, not really knowing what I was looking for. By coincidence a member of the local Family History Society was sitting at the desk and he offered his assistance, and was able to research the 1881 census for me, tracking down my Great Grandfather and his immediate family.

I then went up to Oxford library to search through the microfiche records there and found the record of my Great Grandfather's birth and ordered a copy of the certificate. This confirmed the census details and I was back to the mid 1800s.

Via the internet I joined a Southampton genealogy mailing list, and several people there were able to look up details for me in the local library. This list also brought me into contact with long lost cousins in Leicestershire and Australia, who gave me details of descendants of my Great Grandfather's siblings. Thus my family expanded and I was soon able to piece together a wide tree with nearly 150 relations.

I hope these articles will encourage others to delve into the past with similar success and, if nothing else, discover how our ancestors lived.

Your Garden in February...

...is not as quiet as you might think! This is often the coldest month of the year however, so is a good time to plan changes in the garden order seed catalogues and plan the coming year. If the weather is fine enough to get out, general tidying up after the recent severe frosts is a good idea – cut of dead leaves and firm in any plants lifted by the frost. Once tidy, scatter some fertilizer around to perk things up. (better still mulch with compost if you have any). Avoid walking on frosted lawns as it kills the grass

It is still OK to plant shrubs, trees, fruit bushes providing the ground is not too wet. As snowdrops come into growth, now is an ideal time to split them up if they are overcrowded. Also make a note of where bulbs are showing so that (a) you can fill any gaps in August/ September and (b) you can avoid spearing them with a fork when planting out in the summer.

If you grow veggies, put some polythene down to warm up the soil for sowing later and get the shallots in now.

Cold Greenhouse? Pot up some strawberry plants now and bring them in – with luck you'll be picking strawberries before Wimbledon! Martin Gulliver
