**Next Councillors' surgery** – Peter and Hilary Green's Councillors' surgery will be on the **first Saturday** (7<sup>th</sup>) of October.

**Abingdon Fair** – Monday 9<sup>th</sup> and Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup> Oct. The fair extends the length of Ock Street, so the town centre will be closed. Road closures and diversions begin on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup>.

Runaway Fair – Mon 16<sup>th</sup> Oct - High Street and Square area will be closed. Enjoy yourselves!

### **Drayton Road Traffic**

As you cannot have failed to notice, the traffic jams on Drayton Road in the direction of Abingdon are getting worse, not only in peak hours but at other random, unpredictable times of day. This is partly due to the roadworks going on in the town centre, but since the purpose of these roadworks is to ease traffic in the centre of Abingdon, the situation on Drayton Road will not improve. In addition to this, more houses and flats are being built, which will increase the amount of traffic still further. About 80 new dwellings are due to be built on the site of the old Tesdale School in Blacknall Way. The site of the old Esso petrol station and Renault garage has been sold and will almost certainly be used for house building.

In next month's newsletter, we will include a slip to fill in with your views on what could be done to ease the traffic situation, and, in view of the lack of facilities in South Abingdon, whether you think there should be a shop. Since the closure of the Esso and B.P. petrol stations, the local shop has been Tesco's!

Here are some suggestions for easing the traffic situation:

Re-open the old slip roads on to the A34 between Steventon and Drayton.

Have a proper interchange on to and off the A34 at North Abingdon.

Traffic control at the double roundabout.

A decent bus service to Didcot and to Oxford from South Abingdon, at least every 20 minutes in the rush hour and every half hour outside it. This might persuade some people out of their cars.

An Abingdon town service at times people need to use it, not just during the middle

of the day.

These are just a few suggestions. You may agree or disagree with them, you may have other ideas or you may be content to sit and fume in traffic jams forever, but anyway, next month you will get a chance to give your views.

### The Garden in October

Autumn is now well and truly upon us so a choice has to be made – put the garden to bed for the winter or leave it as it is? The former involves cutting back all dead foliage, tidying up leaves and digging over empty areas of soil. Divide large clump-forming perennial plants, (though this can be left until spring) and tidy up the greenhouse.

The latter involves less work and can encourage wildlife. If plants are left as they are, apart from proving seed heads for birds, they also provide a framework for the garden during the winter, especially when frosts come along. Shelter is also provided for smaller mammals when foraging, and top growth left on plants can protect the main plant from frosts.

In either scheme, the grass should by now have had it's last cut, but if we get a warm spell and it grows again, don't be afraid to give it a light trim. Now is also a good month to put down turf, plant new shrubs and give hedges a trim. Finally try sowing a few hardy annual seeds in a pot or tray and leaving them in a sheltered spot. This should provide good strong early plants next spring.


By the way, my reference to scorched gardens in the last article, whilst being read by you when we had endured three weeks of rain, was written by me after a fortnight's heat wave!
