The Fair and Town Centre closures - By the time you read this, the Michaelmas Fair in Ock Street and the Town Centre will have come and gone. However, there is still the Runaway Fair on Monday 12th October, which will close the High Street and the top end of East and West St Helen Street.

Newsletter deliverer - The newsletter is looking for a volunteer deliverer for half of Longfellow Drive, who would also be willing to collect annual subscriptions. Riverbank Work - Many of you will have noticed the work being done a few weeks ago on the river bank by the Ock Meadow opposite the back of Chaunterell Way. This was to strengthen the bank, which had been eroding for some time and had exposed a disused sewage pipe. Unfortunately, this work has narrowed the channel, creating an extra flood risk.

Tree branches in the river - A resident has noticed that branches have been deliberately cut from trees in the wooded area and thrown into the river. Saws have been used, showing that it is premeditated damage, not just spontaneous mischief. Parents, please check what your children are up to in the Ock meadow. It might not just be fishing and games of football.


Flood Group - A flood group committee has now been formed and is applying for a grant to begin some flood mitigation work along the Ock. This will initially consist of some practical work to be carried out by volunteers, such as clearing the river channel. If you were at the meeting at 35 Ock Street back in February, you may remember that a number of people put their names forward as being willing to form a flood group. A survey, in the form of questionnaires to every household, will be conducted within the next few weeks and will give you the opportunity to volunteer to help in some way, though you will not be obliged to wield a spade.

Save Abingdon from Expansion - Good news from SAFE - it appears that the favoured site for major housing development in the Vale is likely to be the Wantage site rather than on the fields between Masefield Crescent and the A34. The Vale has sent a report to this effect to Oxfordshire County Council. The Vale Council seems to have realised that the difficulties of building 1,500 houses on the latter site, such as traffic congestion, proximity of the flood plain and archaeological importance would be too great. That is good news for Tithe Farm/Ladygrove as there was overwhelming opposition to the plan but it's not over till it's over as they say, so keep an eye on the situation. ## The Garden in Octaber

The days will definitely be getting colder now although a lot of plants, especially bedding, should last until the first frost - usually early next month. However plan ahead and plant up winter baskets now, using pansies or violas, adding an evergreen such as trailing ivy.


Sow sweet peas in pots now and they will over-winter safely to give stronger and better flowers next year. Use old toilet roll tubes, as sweet peas have long roots and the whole thing can be planted out next year. This applies to all hardy annuals (sowing now, not the toilet roll thing...)


If you took any cuttings in the summer, these can now be potted up and put in a sheltered spot to overwinter. As a general rule, cold is not the problem over winter so much as damp - keep pots on the dry side if possible.


Plant tulips now and next month. As with other bulbs, plant them three to four times their own depth, and a sprinkling of gravel at the bottom of the hole will prevent waterlogging.
If you have any permanent containers, raise them off the ground using special terracotta feet or pieces of wood, so as to assist drainage.


If the weather allows it, keep the grass trimmed so as to avoid the usual jungle-like hacking next spring when you'll so wish you hadn't left it to grow...
