



GRIT BOXES - When its icy and your drive, footpath etc becomes iced up, don't forget that you can use the salt/grit mix from the large green grit boxes that are around the estates, located on the entrance of Mill Road and the green on Wordsworth Road. Following the few days of snow we had at the beginning of the year some drives became compacted with ice, a Masefield Crescent resident's car slid down their drive overnight (despite having the handbrake on AND was in gear) and was found part way across the footpath in the morning.

How many of us have reported this problem over the past year? The Residents' Association is aware of at least six reports to contact@oxontime.com and we are sure that many other bus users have done so too. But at last we have managed to get a reply from the organisation! But the news is not good. We were told that, in the first place, the County Council have not allocated any budget for

repairs of this sort and, secondly, that these sort of displays are now regarded as 'old technology' and that 'newer replacement solutions' are being looked at. In the meantime, they suggest we use our smart phones to access Oxontime information from various sources, such as Traveline, or look at their website. They do acknowledge that there will be some people who are unable to access information this way.

SPEEDING ON OUR ESTATES - We are aware that a number of residents have complained about vehicles occasionally speeding along our roads. We are not aware of any accidents or injuries because of this – yet. But the threat of something dreadful happening is always there if people are selfish enough to try to get off our



estates just those few seconds quicker. We hope to be able to discuss this with our PCSO sometime when she is able to get to a TFLRA meeting although we are unsure what she will be able to advise. Does anyone have any ideas about how to tackle this problem? We would say now that we know that it is extremely unlikely that any kind of traffic calming measure such as 20 mph zones, speed bumps or chicanes could be installed.



FENCE PROBLEM BETWEEN MABERLEY CLOSE AND FRANCIS LITTLE DRIVE - Many thanks to the resident who fixed the broken down fencing on the footpaths between these two garage areas. The footpaths and garage areas are 'private property' so there was no chance of getting this fixed through any local Council.

NEW ABINGDON TOWN CEMETERY? - Followers of the Abingdon Blog may have seen a report on 3rd February saying that Abingdon Town Council are considering sites for a new cemetery as the existing one is getting full. Apparently it has grave space for about another eight or ten years. Currently, there are about 100 burials a year - so 2 or so a week. One possibility is land behind Masefield Crescent. The blog has a picture of the field opposite the new Morland Gardens houses but we understand from Cllr Mike Badcock that the Council are actually considering the top of the field next to Mill Road. All this must be at an early stage

BUYING PLANTS (Martin Gulliver writes) - These days there are a proliferation of garden centres and they are far more numerous than nurseries, although the latter, if you can track them down, have a far wider range of plants. Mail order is also an option, with excellent prices, and a wide range, but many people like to see what they are buying. Here are a few tips when perusing plants in the garden centre.

Look for a healthy plant with no dead or diseased wood, and strong new growth in the form of new buds. Beware of plants that look weak and leggy.

Don't be afraid to tip the plant out of its pot to check the root ball. The roots should fill the pot, but not to the extent that there are circling the pot - this may indicate an old plant that is pot-bound. Make sure also to remove any small weeds from the pot - too many weeds may also indicate an old plant.

Check the label carefully - will it suit your soil? The place you plan to plant it? Will it grow too big? Is it frost resistant? If in doubt ask an expert at the centre.

Most centres will be selling plants in bloom at the time for obvious reasons - but don't be afraid to buy dormant perennials this time of year as long as they look healthy and are showing signs of growth.

Beware of plug plants and bedding on sale early. They may need protection from frost and centres are inclined to display these early under cover, but they will suffer if planted out immediately. Finally, don't be afraid to check the 'sale' items - these are often plants past their flowering time that can be bought cheap for colour later in the year. Indeed perennials that have gone over can be split to provide more plants - this goes for any perennial bought while dormant on just in bud.

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THE POPLARS - Residents will have seen the For Sale/Sold signs outside this former care home on the Drayton Road but we are not sure how many people will be aware of the planning application made to the Vale just before Christmas. This was noticed by the Residents' Association in mid-January, about a week before the end of the month consultation period. The information is on the Vale's Planning website under P18/V3012/FUL. You will see that the application is to demolish



the existing buildings and rebuild with a three-storey block of 8 two-bed flats. Considerable concern was felt about the height and bulk of the building, the loss of privacy for residents of Burton Close and Mill Road, the number of vehicles likely to be going in and out at this very busy junction and anxiety about the safety of school children using the adjacent alleyway and pedestrian crossing. We did our best to alert people to this application and some objections were made before the consultation closed.

At the time of writing this (early March), the outcome of the application is still undecided. We are hoping that this might mean that these plans are being revised to something more in keeping with the area. As soon as we know of any developments, we will update the blog.



SOMETHING FISHY IN THE RIVER OCK (by Max the Wildlife Watcher) - When looking into the shallows of the clear waters of the River Ock, I am happy to spot a fish or two. As the river is barely 9 m. wide most of its length and very shallow and very

clear, it allows you the luxury of observing fish behaviour up close. I cannot get the perfect answer to the species that I have seen from the Mill Bridge crossing. I know that there will be many experts out there who will know a lot more than I do.

I have decided to describe Squalius cephalus, also known as Chub (it sounds great with my native northern accent). Spawning happens when the water temperature reaches 14°C, and lasts from May to September. Juvenile chub seem happy to shoal in very large numbers (safety in numbers), seemingly in same year group and with other fish of a similar size, so you'd often find them alongside dace, gudgeon and similar sized perch. When they get larger they get more wary (survival of the fittest?) and swim with smaller groups of a similar size.

It is a stocky fish with a large rounded head. Its body is long and cylindrical in shape and is covered large greenish-brown scales, which are edged with narrow bands of black. The tail is dark brown or black, the dorsal fin is a greyish-green and all the other fins are orange-red. The large, solitary adults prey mainly on freshwater shrimp and small fishes. Large chub also eat considerable numbers of small fish, as well as frogs, crayfish, voles and young water birds! They have also been observed eating berries such as blackberries and elderberry from overhanging trees. The fish can live for up to 22 years in the wild, where the age of fish can be assessed through by the number of rings that are visible in scales.

If this has whet your appetite at becoming an angler, contact the Abingdon Town council for a permit or Abingdon and Oxford Anglers Alliance. The fishing season ends at dusk on 14th March and commences at dawn on 16th June. This allows most fish to mate and spawn, so the river is quietly restocked. Fishing permits are free for Abingdon residents.

I would like to think the river systems of the UK are much cleaner than 30 years ago, but the Environment Agency who monitor the local rivers will have a much better idea. The best thing we can do is make sure none of our own litter goes in the river. I try and pick up any I see, whilst enjoying a walk along our lovely local river. I have heard reports that signs of otters have been spotted in the river Ock again, maybe this is the year I will be lucky to see one?

ROAD - Problems with the poor road surface at this junction continue. In 2018, potholes were reported and were later filled. However, the edges of the new filling appeared to crumble almost immediately. There were a couple of new reports on FixMyStreet complaining about this. The whole area is now in a very poor state and was again reported. In mid-February, Oxfordshire CC Highways confirmed that 'it would be fixed'.

At the time of writing, we see that 2 or 3 of the larger pot holes have been marked to be filled. It seems that there is little chance that the whole area will be tackled, so the problems will continue.

HELP THE HEDGEHOGS! (Eleanor Dangerfield writes) - It's a few years since I saw a hedgehog in my garden. Hedgehogs are in trouble and need our help. They'll soon be coming out of hibernation and looking for food. Hedgehogs forage at night and cover a large range, up to three miles. The best way to help them is to collaborate with your neighbours and cut a hole in your fence. About the size of a CD case is sufficient so there's no risk of dogs getting through. This way we can make a "hedgehog street". If you put food out for hedgehogs, never, ever give them bread and milk. Apparently mealworms are bad for them too, though they do love them. You can buy specialised hedgehog food or



meat based cat or dog food. Don't give them too much, however. After all, you do want them to eat up your slugs!



FLOOD PREVENTATION - Very little hope for better flood protection in Abingdon in the near future emerged from the public meeting held in the Guildhall on 7th March. Local papers have published an account of this meeting with MP Layla Moran and the Environment Agency, so residents will know that the plan for a water storage area on Abingdon

Common has been 'put on ice' due to the cost and the Environment Agency's projection that that this would not be as effective as they originally thought. Other long term solutions are being looked at apparently, at a relatively lower cost.
